

Co-Constructing Learning

What It Is

- Invite understanding of one another, and seek consensus around "what is going on here."
- Deepen knowledge, shared meanings, and collaborative problem solving.
- Embrace learning as a social process.
- Enable power sharing within a safe environment where participants feel confident to share ideas.
- Value all participants' contributions for shared knowledge building.
- Promote and build reciprocal relationships of mutual respect to improve co-construction.

Why It Matters

- The meaning of evidence, interactions, and language are always contextual.
- Clarity of purpose and communication across the system are improved by learning from and with one another.
- New understandings for change can develop via co-constructed collaborations.
- Engagement and commitment to action are enhanced by co-constructing learning.
- Relationships are strengthened through co-construction.

How I Do It

- Build shared language and meanings.
- Check for understanding and agreement.

- Listen, notice, and monitor one's own impact.
- Deliberately build community and trust through the process of co-construction.
- Use tools such as the inquiry spiral to co-construct shared understanding and discuss concepts at a deeper level.
- Value others' perspectives and knowledge, including learners and their families.
- Create opportunities for others, including those not usually heard, to contribute in meaningful ways.

Key Challenges for Me

- Working through the tension between "being asked and wanting to tell" versus co-constructing
- Dealing with agenda-setting dilemmas
- Needing more time to reach solutions and actions
- Living with the discomfort inherent in co-construction
- Changing how strategies for problem solving and decision-making are undertaken

What I Should Notice

- What knowledge is at the table? Does it include learning principles, literature, theories, and research findings?
- Whose voices are heard, and whose are missing?
- What opportunities are there for co-construction?
- How do leaders co-construct (share power) with teachers and other stakeholders?

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
