

King Duncan is told of Macbeth's bravery in battle and his defeat of the Norwegian king. Duncan orders that the treacherous Thane of Cawdor is executed and declares that Macbeth shall take his title.

Macbeth worries about the consequences of killing Duncan and decides against it. However, Lady Macbeth scoffs at his weakness and concocts a plan to get the guards drunk and frame them for the king's murder.

On his way to Duncan's chamber, Macbeth encounters Banquo who is distracted by their encounter with the Witches. Macbeth has a vision of a bloody dagger leading the way to Duncan – he follows it and carries out the plan.


Act 2 Scene 2 When Macbeth returns from committing the murder, Lady Macbeth criticises his feelings of guilt and declares him weak. She is angry that he has brought the bloody daggers with him and takes them back to the crime scene to frame the guards.


