Being Aware of Cultural Positioning

What It Is

- View linguistic and cultural responsiveness (LCR) as a way of being and working, not an add-on.
- Hold a deep personal commitment to social justice.
- Value diversity in learning and learners.
- Demonstrate a willingness to question own and others' assumptions.
- Have a desire to create strong, trusting, and respectful relationships.
- Be aware of the privileged nature of some knowledge and the negative effects of this.

Why It Matters

- Identity, culture, and language play a central role in learning at all levels.
- Cultural positioning influences what we notice, ignore, and act on.
- Commitment to LCR action is critical to improving educational outcomes for diverse learners.
- LCR is often espoused but not enacted.
- Learners are empowered or disempowered as a result of interactions in school.
- Knowledge building about LCR practice is critical for change.

How I Do It

- Create commitment to diverse students' success.
- Value family and community knowledge so that success includes, not excludes, students' culture, language, and identities.

- Co-construct commitment to action with educators, families, and community knowledge holders.
- Take a strengths-based approach to engaging others in taking action.
- Develop relationships of respect.
- Make language and culture central to learning and teaching programmed.

Key Challenges for Me

- Recognizing potential discomfort in cultural biases and confronting assumptions
- Embedding languages and culture across school practices and within teaching and learning programs
- Existing priorities and creating space for community knowledge within curriculum planning and programs
- Developing equitable reciprocal relationships for learning

What I Should Notice

- What are my narratives, stories, or metaphors?
- What are my own (sometimes "invisible") cultural biases?
- What are the effects of my power?
- What do I notice, and what untapped potential might I be ignoring?
