## Silent E rule

Drop the final $\mathbf{E}$ from a word when adding -al, -ed, ing, -able, -ate (suffixes beginning with vowels)

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Ex:
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remove-removal
date-dating
love-lovable
Don't drop the final E from a word when adding any other suffix (suffixes beginning with consonants)

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Ex:
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    love-lovely
    care-careful
    Ex:
(silente) (sílente)
The adorable pup was loved by
(silente) (sílente)
his lovely new playmates.

## PRACTICE THE CONVERSATION:

A: Read the sentence at the bottom, please.
B: The adorable pup was loved by his lovely new playmates.

A: Great. Which of these words have a silent-E word as a root word?

B: Four of them. Adorable, loved, lovely, playmates.

A: Yes. And can you turn those into their silent-E roots?

B: Sure. Adore, love, love, playmate.
A: Why does the "E" stay on some of those words and get dropped on others?

B: The silent E has to stay on the word unless it's replaced by another vowel. So if the suffix starts with a vowel, the "E" can go. If there's no vowel, the "E" has to stay.
